


Data Brief: Reports of Sexual Violence Among Minnesota Youth Up in 2022

The percent of Minnesota students who reported experiencing sexual violence increased substantially between 2016 and 2022, according to Minnesota Student Survey (MSS) data. These findings point to an increased need for sexual violence services, response, and prevention starting at early ages, across every area of the state, and for all communities.

Reports of all types of sexual violence increased among 9th and 11th graders

In 2016, nearly 1 in 10 (9.8%) 9th and 11th graders said they had experienced some form of sexual violence. In 2022, that percentage rose to nearly 1 in 7 (13.5%). Students reported higher rates of all types of sexual violence, but the type with the greatest increase was sexual violence by someone who was not a family member or relative, which increased from 3.8% in 2016 to 7.1% in 2022.

The percent of 9th and 11th graders who reported any type of sexual violence victimization increased from 2016 to 2022.




Percent of 9th and 11th graders experiencing sexual violence

Reports of sexual violence increased most among 8th graders

The percent of 8th graders reporting sexual violence by a relative or family member and the percent of students reporting sexual violence by a non-relative or family member both increased. In 2016, 1 in 23 (4.4%) 8th graders reported experiencing one or more types of sexual violence. In 2022, that percentage increased to nearly 1 in 13 (8.0%) 8th graders who reported experiencing one or more types of violence.

The percent of 8th graders who reported any type of sexual violence victimization nearly doubled between 2016 and 2022.



Increases took place across the state

Trends showing an increase in the percent of students reporting sexual violence were not isolated to one part of the state. The figure below shows the increase in the percent of 8th graders reporting sexual violence from 2016 to 2022. The percent of 8th graders reporting sexual violence increased in all regions of the state. Increases ranged from 38% in the West Central region to 111% in the South Central region.*

There was an increase in the percentage of 8th graders who reported any type of sexual violence in both Greater Minnesota and the 7-County Metro Area.

About the Minnesota Student Survey (MSS)

Every three years, students in grades 5, 8, 9, and 11 in participating schools complete the Minnesota Student Survey (MSS) which asks a range of anonymous questions about wellbeing, health, and safety. Students in grades 8, 9, and 11 answer questions about sexual violence. In 2022, over 135,000 students took the survey.
