



### **Immunizations and Review**

## CHILD AND TEEN CHECKUPS (C&TC) FACT SHEET FOR PRIMARY CARE PROVIDERS

A review of the immunization history is required at every C&TC visit. Administer ageappropriate vaccines that are due; if these are not given, document why and include a plan for catch-up vaccines. Providers should provide accurate vaccine information, address parent concerns, and refer to reliable resources.

### **C&TC** standards

#### General

A review of the immunization history is required at every C&TC visit to determine if the child is due or overdue for any vaccines (including COVID-19) according to the recommended Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices Immunization Schedules.

Children and youth receiving care through C&TC must be given vaccines through the Minnesota Vaccines for Children Program.

#### Personnel

A licensed health care provider must review the immunization record and follow up appropriately: physician, nurse practitioner, physician assistant, or registered or public health nurse (RN, PHN) who has completed the C&TC Comprehensive Screening training through the Minnesota Department of Health.

#### **Documentation**

Document assessment of the child's immunization history and administration of immunizations. If immunizations were due but not given, document why and a plan for

catch-up vaccines. Federal law requires providing the most current <u>Vaccine</u> <u>Information Statement (VIS)</u> prior to immunization. Document that a VIS was given, date given, and publication date.

Accept only written, dated documentation (including pictures of this documentation, or electronic record) as evidence of previous vaccination (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 2024). The <a href="Minnesota Immunization Information Connection">Minnesota Immunization Information Connection</a> stores records to assess a patient's immunization history.

Refer to the <u>C&TC Provider Documentation</u> <u>Forms</u> for documentation examples or to use as a template with your electronic medical record.

### **Procedure**

Refer to specific vaccine administration guidelines and <u>Immunization Best Practices</u>.

Give VIS and information to help parents anticipate and manage potential mild side effects. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention does not recommend antipyretics before or at the time of vaccination (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 2024). Medications may be given for fever or pain after vaccination if needed.

Report significant adverse events to the <u>Vaccine Adverse Event Reporting System</u> even if there is no known causal relationship to vaccination.

### **Addressing vaccine concerns**

Most parents vaccinate their children, but some will have vaccine questions and/or concerns. Refer to <u>Vaccines for Your</u> Children.

Medical Assistance can now be billed for stand-alone vaccination counseling visits. Providers billing for counseling services must be able to administer the vaccine for which they are counseling. Billable standalone vaccine counseling visits do not replace immunization review and administration as required during a complete C&TC visit. These visits are only billable when done outside of routine well visits. Refer to C&TC: Vaccine Counseling.

# Professional recommendations

## Centers for Disease Control and Prevention

Routine vaccination is recommended to prevent 17 vaccine-preventable diseases (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 2024).
