#### **Tribal-State Relations Statement**

- The State of Minnesota is home to 11 federally recognized Indian Tribes with elected Tribal government officials. The State of Minnesota acknowledges and supports the unique political status of Tribal Nations across Minnesota and their absolute right to existence, self-governance, and selfdetermination. This unique relationship with federally recognized Indian Tribes is cemented by the Constitution of the United States, treaties, statutes, case law, and agreements. The State of Minnesota and Tribal governments across Minnesota significantly benefit from working together, learning from one another, and partnering where possible.
- The Minnesota Department of Health recognizes, values, and celebrates the vibrant and unique relationships between the 11 Tribal Nations and the State of Minnesota. Partnerships formed through government-to-government relationships with these Tribes will effectively address health disparities and lead to better health outcomes for all of Minnesota.

- "School-based health center" or "comprehensive school-based health center" means a safety net health care delivery model that is located in or near a school facility and that offers comprehensive health care, including preventive and behavioral health services, provided by licensed and qualified health professionals in accordance with federal, state, and local law. When not located on school property, the school-based health center must have an established relationship with one or more schools in the community and operate to primarily serve those student groups.
- SBHCs provide health services to all students and youth within a school or school district, regardless of ability to pay, insurance coverage, or immigration status, and in accordance with federal, state, and local law

#### **SBHC Services**

In addition to comprehensive and preventative health care, services provided by a SBHC can include:

- Mental health care and crisis management
- Oral health care
- Vision care
- Nutritional counseling

- Substance abuse counseling
- Referral to specialist, medical home or hospice for care
- Additional services that address social determinants of health
- Emerging services such as mobile health and telehealth

#### **Program Description**

<u>Minnesota Statute 145.903</u>, Subd. 2(a) authorizes MDH to administer a program to provide grants to school districts and School-Based Health Centers (SBHCs) to support existing centers and facilitate the growth of SBHCs in Minnesota.

This funding opportunity will support two separate categories:

- Category 1: New and Emerging Grant for new and emerging clinics
- Category 2: Operating Clinic Grant for established and operating clinics

## Category 1: New and Emerging Clinics

 Category 1: The New and Emerging Grant is a onetime opportunity for organizations that are in the planning stage of opening a new SBHC. The grant provides 3 years of funding to plan, organized and open a new SBHC. By the end of year 2 it is expected that a new SBHC will be ready to open and be operational in year 3.

Category 1: New and Emerging Grant	
\$50,000 Year 1: Planning	Hire staff, work to assess the need for a new SBHC site, establish community support, identify, and secure operating partners and sponsoring organization.
\$62,500 Year 2: Emerging	Hire staff, set up clinic with equipment and supplies, set up Electronic Medical Record and other technology software.
\$75,000 Year 3: Open	First year of clinic open and provider services available to entire student population.
Total amount of 3-year grant	\$187,500

## Category 2: Operating Clinics

 The Operating Clinic Grant provides funding for established SBHCs to support the operation of, improve upon and/or expand services in one or more SBHCs. To be considered for this category, a SBHC site must be in operation within the first 3 months of receiving the grant. The funding amount is based on the totally number of operating hours per sponsoring organization.

Category 2: Operating Clinic Grant	
\$50,000 a year for 3 Years \$150,000 Total	Up to 10 hours/week combined hours with all sponsored clinics
\$75,000 a year for 3 Years \$225,000 Total	11-40 hour/week combined hours with all sponsored clinics
\$100,000 a year for 3 Years \$300,000 Total	40+ hours/week combined hours with all sponsored clinics

Category 1: New and Emerging Grant Funding	Estimate
Estimated Total Amount to Grant	\$500,000 a year/3 years
Estimated Number of Awards	8
Estimated Award Maximum	\$50,000 year 1, \$62,500 year 2, \$75,000 year 3. Totaling \$187,000

Category 2: Operating Clinic Grant Funding	Estimate
Estimated Total Amount to Grant	\$1,200,000 a year/3 years
Estimated Number of Awards	16
Estimated Award Maximum	\$50k, \$75k, or \$100k/year based on average

#### **Eligible to Apply**

For both New and Emerging and Operating Clinic grants, applicants must be one the following:

- A public school, school district, or Educational Service District (including charter schools, Tribal schools and alternative learning centers)
- A community-based org. including non-profits, Tribal community clinic programs which represent the community to be served by the SBHC
- A medical (including dental) or mental health care organization intending to sponsor the SBHC
- Current SBHC sponsoring organizations
- Local health departments

### Allowable Grants Costs and Activities

- Staffing
- Supplies
- Equipment
- Furniture, including cabinets and moveable walls
- Marketing
- Training and travel expenses
- Technology and phones
- Uncompensated care

### Unallowable Grant Costs and Activities

- Major capital improvement to property
- Solicitating donations
- Taxes, except sales tax on good and services
- Lobbyists, political contributions
- Bad debts, late payment fees, finance charges, or contingency funds

#### **Required Grant Activities**

- Submit progress reports every twice a year
- Work collaboratively with MDH and the MNSBHA
- Participate in MNSBHA's monthly Community of Practice forums
- Submit clinic data to the following portals: Locations and Services Log, Cost of Care, Quality Counts, National Census

#### **Review and Selection Process**

- MDH determines initial eligibility
- Review committee scores application on the criteria in RFP Appendix I
  - Project Summary (5 points)
  - Organization Description (20 points)
  - Project Narrative (40 points)
  - Work Plan Template (20 points)
  - Budget Details (15 points)

• MDH will make final decisions on all applications and will balance the recommendations by the review teams with other factors including, but not limited to:

- Review team scores
- Representativeness of collaboration
- Representativeness of community need
- Geographic distribution of services
- Total funding available

MDH conducts due diligence and past performance reviews prior to entering into grant agreements

School-Based Health Centers (SBHCs) are a safety net health care delivery model located in or near a school facility that provides students with high quality comprehensive medical care, including preventive and behavioral health services. These services are provided by licensed and qualitied health professionals in accordance with federal, state and local law Additional services provided by a SBHC can include but are not limited to: chronic medical condition management, including diabetes and asthma care, acute care for illness and injury, oral health care, vision care, nutritional counseling, reproductive health care, substance abuse care and counseling, referral to a specialist, medical home, or hospital for care, services that address social determinates of health and emerging services such as mobile health and telehealth. SBHCs are open to all students and youth within a school or district regardless of ability to pay, insurance coverage, or immigration status. When not located on school property, the SBHC must have an established relationship with one or more schools in the community and operate to primarily serve those student groups.

Research demonstrates that young people are more likely to seek out and use health services that are easy to get to, in a familiar location, are youth-friendly, culturally and linguistically appropriate. SBHCs are affordable, accessible, convenient, and uphold all state laws already in place for parent knowledge, consent and student confidentiality.

Minnesota Statute 145,903 authorizes the Minnesota Department of Health (MDH) to administer a program to provide grants to school districts, sponsoring agencies, and school-based health centers to support existing centers and facilitate the growth of school-based health centers in Minnesota.
