Overview

Established by the Minnesota Legislature in 1978, the Family Planning Special Projects grant funds support essential pre-pregnancy sexual and reproductive health services for people with the least access, due to structural inequities. In 2023, the program name was changed to Sexual and Reproductive Health Services (SRHS). Grants are awarded to counties, cities, and non-profit organizations to provide services in communities throughout the state. SRHS funds can be used for public information, outreach, counseling, contraceptive method provision, and referrals and follow-up care. Outreach

Outreach activities include one-to-one and group activities designed to inform members of the target population about family planning and all family planning services available in the geographic area. This includes presentations at places such as group homes or colleges that provide factual information on reproductive and sexual health, including pregnancy prevention and all contraceptive methods. It also includes meeting individuals at events such as health fairs and providing information on a one-to-one basis.

Number of group sessions convened: 4,604

Counseling

Contraceptive counseling means providing, on an individual basis, of factual information on pregnancy planning and all contraceptive methods, and the use of non-directive interview techniques to promote optimum health relative to pregnancy planning and contraception.
